## RESOLUTION 1 – Resolution in support of a Coordinated Action on Behalf of Undocumented Neighbors

WHEREAS, we recognize that there are numbers of people seeking new life in the United States, continually putting themselves at risk both in travelling and taking up residence in the United States, and the federal government continues to fail to enact comprehensive economic and immigration reforms; and

WHEREAS, the teaching of the Old Testament clearly commands that we love the alien as we love ourselves (Leviticus 19:33) and Jesus defines his own ministry as "to set those who are oppressed" (Luke 4:18); and

WHEREAS, the Methodist tradition in its past had leading figures standing against the injustice of slavery and oppression, including our own John Wesley, Thomas Coke, Gilbert Haven, and Orange Scott, who serve as examples for us fighting for the rights of our undocumented neighbors; and

WHEREAS, distress and fear are paralyzing and affecting our ministry with "the least of these" (Matthew 25: 40), and believing that God will bring justice, the words of Esther 4: 14 are very pertinent today, "For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place....And who knows but that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?";

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that we, the Hispanic/Latino pastors and allies of the South Georgia Conference, call on the presiding Bishop of the Annual Conference to form a specific task force for the purpose of developing a strategy to:

- provide education to the members of the South Georgia Conference, both clergy and laity, about the history
  of immigration throughout the centuries and human and civil rights concerning our undocumented
  members, and
- encourage members of our South Georgia United Methodist churches who so choose to engage in concrete Wesleyan works of piety and mercy—seeking justice, ending discrimination and addressing the needs of the poor—on behalf of our undocumented neighbors.

FURTHERMORE, be it resolved, that due consideration be given to the cost and duration of such efforts to educate and engage this important issue.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the South Georgia Conference, and especially those entities relating to social issues, such as Advocacy Discipleship Team, Connectional Ministries and the Cabinet, along with pastors, congregations and individual members who share or want to be in ministry, unite to promote education and works of mercy in a number of ways, including:

1. Identify or develop a curriculum that teaches our churches the Biblical foundations regarding aliens and foreigners and examines our Wesleyan roots and United Methodist Social Principles in a way that promotes working on behalf of undocumented neighbors among us;

Identify, recruit, and equip churches, clergy and individual members to imagine and strategize, in
partnership with our undocumented neighbors, social action and advocacy opportunities in which all
interested parties may engage;

3. Provide for the Conference published tools, both print and online, in collaboration with the Connectional Table, including pertinent publications to educate and update on specific issues related to the struggles of "the foreigner among us" at local, state, and federal levels;

 4. Build bridges with other religious and non-religious organizations in our region to cooperate in these efforts and so multiply our effectiveness in this endeavor;
5. Form a research and work group, in cooperation with Global Ministries and any pertinent agency, to

Form a research and work group, in cooperation with Global Ministries and any pertinent agency, to promote mission cooperation in the countries of origin of many of our undocumented neighbors to support and create development in these communities to alleviate the problems that cause our undocumented neighbors to flee their beloved countries in the first place.

RESOLUTION 2 – A Resolution Regarding the
Report to the Bishop and Cabinet Form
WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church believes that longer appointments are beneficial to the overall health of the church/clergy and
WHEREAS, in multiple studies on church growth and vitality document that churches and pastors often have their best ministry beginning after the fourth year and
WHEREAS, the average tenure for all ministers in the United States is at 3.6 years due to conflict in years three and four of shared ministry and
WHEREAS, the South Georgia annual conference mails the <i>Report to the Bishop and Cabinet</i> form every year that ask about a change in pastor and
WHEREAS, when the current <i>Report to the Bishop and Cabinet</i> form is received it causes anxiety for the clergy, the family of the clergy and the local church
<b>Be it therefore resolved</b> that the <i>Report to the Bishop and Cabinet</i> form mailed to the clergy and the pastor/staff parish will no longer indicate a desire to change pastors but instead remind churches of the desire for longer appointments and ask for ways to continue to improve the ministry of the local church. (See below for potential revised form.)
If necessary, a study committee could be appointed to come up with a new form that reflects the change in language to be presented at the next annual conference.
New form:
Dear Colleagues and Churches in ministry:
Each year the appointive cabinet meets together to prayerfully consider each clergy person and church in our annual conference. The desire is to place a clergy person into a setting for ministry that best reflects their gifts with the needs of the local church or extension ministry. It has been noted in multiple studies that longer tenured appointments are better for the health of the church and clergy. As such we will no longer be asking about a change for clergy but rather asking how we can best assist in making your church-clergy relationship more healthy.
What are your strengths as a church/clergy? (This will be different, depending on whether it is for the clergy or the church.)
